WAIT A MINUTE! THE SCIENCE OF NEW ENGLAND WEATHER MONDAYS, SEPTEMBER 9, 16, 23, 30 & OCTOBER 7 @ 11:30AM -12:30PM

From the Montreal Express to the Bermuda High, New England lies in a battleground of competing atmospheric conditions. Heat and

humidity from the tropics meet bitter arctic cold directly above us. The result is our very interesting and unpredictable weather patterns. This 5-week program begins with a study of local conditions observed in our backyards, and moves to global conditions that influence our weather from far-off places. We complete the study with a closer look at the familiar regional quirks that influence us even further.

Presenter: As a commercial pilot and instrument flight instructor, Frank Villa has experienced many of the challenges of New England weather first-hand. He combines this background with his enthusiasm for lecturing on natural phenomena of all kinds to help explain the fascinating and unpredictable world of New England weather.

She teaches at Regis College for their Lifelong Learning Programs as well as at various libraries, senior centers and retirement communities. She was active in the formation of the Boston Lyric Opera Company and served as Vice President of the Boston Wagner Society, where she presented lectures, helped organize concerts and promoted visiting scholars.

Poetry is revered as among our highest cultural achievements. Its near-universal presence in oral and written traditions attests to its grip on the human psyche. In today's world, however, when times seem to be spinning out of control, poetry can appear a trivial afterthought to the problems of real life. Sure, it may offer a moment of solace or pleasure, but not much in the way of practical solutions. Or maybe that's not the whole story. In this course we'll explore poems that show us how poetry makes sense of—and helps us deal with—excessive human folly and its consequences.

Presenter: Barton Kunstler, Ph.D., has written and studied poetry all his life. He holds an undergraduate degree in English literature and a doctorate in Classical Studies from BU. His poems have been published in various venues and he has run writing and communication programs. He was a full professor and program director at Lesley University's School of Management.

Wednesday, October 2 at 2:00 p.m. "Arequipa - Peru's Enchanting Land of Volcanoes"

Arequipa, the Spanish colonial-era capital of Peru, is nestled in the Andes Mountains and framed by three snow-capped volcanoes. The entire old town, declared a UNESCO World Heritage site, is filled with baroque buildings constructed from sillar, a white volcanic stone. At its center is the

leafy Plaza de Armas, a stately main square from where the city grew and which serves today to attract families, visitors, vendors and musicians. Barry Pell and his wife lived in Arequipa for one month, experiencing the city as residents, and learning about its vivid indigenous and Spanish history and culture. Wednesday, November 6 at 2:00 p.m. "Faroe Islands - Rugged Nature in the North Atlantic"

The Faroes are a group of eighteen remote islands settled by Vikings over a thousand years ago. Their volcanic origin, and later erosion by retreating ice age glaciers, has given the islands an austere beauty of

steep ridges, sharp pyramidal peaks, and deep rounded valleys. Carpeted in myriad shades of green from summer rains and winter snow melt, the islands are filled with cascading waterfalls and the verdant fields dotted with turf-roofed wooden houses, ancient churches, and lots of gently grazing sheep. Barry Pell recently traveled to nearly all the Faroe Islands, photographing the landscape and meeting its people. He left with the impression that the wild, wet and windy Faroes are the most beautiful of all the places he's traveled.
